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Reassessing Metaphor

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### Definition

A figure of speech in which a word or phrase that ordinarily designates one thing is used to designate another, thus making an *implicit* comparison.



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The meaning that most immediately presents itself is not always the intended meaning – or, at least, does not exhaust that meaning.

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### Example

The man has a heart of stone.

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cf. Trump presents himself as an eagle, but he's more of a dodo.

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cf. He was looking for a safe haven, but that's not what he found.

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What is metaphorical in language is first – in some substantive sense – metaphorical in thought. Reassessing Metaphor

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- Takes as the distinguishing feature of metaphor the mapping of one domain onto another, target domain.

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 What is or isn't a metaphor, dead or otherwise, is largely a matter of perspective. Reassessing Metaphor

- Non-standard uses of pitch in music.

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Metaphor is best understood in terms of a continuum of meanings from primary (most standard, "literal") to secondary, tertiary, and outright novel.

- The meaning cannot be too novel; why?
- Metaphors follow a life cycle: they typically start out as novel usages, become conventionalized, and over time cease (for the majority of non-specialists) to be recognized as metaphors at all.

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  - In the case of fictive motion: an underlying bias toward motion in structured thought and language.

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

- Metaphor very, very often serves to give the abstract a greater concreteness.


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
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

- The latter would appear to require representation, which requires per Inman Harvey communication.
  - Most discussion of representation should be understood in terms of loose, metaphorical usage.

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    - "When in doubt, always make explicit the Q and S when P is used by Q to represent R to S."
  - Likewise many agents show pre-reflective consciousness with no evidence of reflective self consciousness.
  - Probably no surprise that the species that appear to have the capacity to recognize themselves as themselves are also the ones with "complex" cognitive abilities are also all "social" species.

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# Metaphorical cognition would appear to require...

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- Capacity to turn one's attention from one or another instance of meaning making to the *vehicle* of that meaning making.
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- What does language add?

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- What does language add?
  - Many more opportunities to conventionalize metaphor.

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  - A much greater need for metaphor.

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- Metaphor is only ever, and can only be, a fairly roughly defined subset of meaning making.

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- Metaphor is only ever, and can only be, a fairly roughly defined subset of meaning making.
- Endless arguments over what is or isn't really a metaphor miss the point: metaphor is a matter of perspective taking.
- There is nothing straightforwardly literal about "literal" meaning, which has nearly all the shades of meaning of metaphorical meaning, even though it tends to be more concrete.
